Course description

The course has four main components. The first one is to assess EU-Russia and EU-China relations at the level of the world international order in the early 21st Century. The second is to see how EU-China and EU-Russia relations intersect with the foreign policies of the EU member states, with a focus on the Central and Eastern European member states. The third is to assess the extent to which these relations are being discussed, if not challenged, within the domestic politics of the same EU member States. The fourth component is to contribute via small research assignments to a research project on establishing scoreboards of the foreign policies of the EU Member States towards China and Russia within the format of research seminars. Prerequisites: EUR 212 or permission by instructor. Credits [6 ECTS].

Learning Outcomes

After completing this course, the student should be able to:

1) Demonstrate a general knowledge of the different aspects of the interactions between EU foreign policy and member states' foreign policy towards Russia and China

2) To assess critically individual member states' foreign policy towards Russia and China

3) Master the different theoretical concepts linked to international relations used in the course.
